Background on the rebuilding of Jerusalem, and particularly its temple, after the return of the Israelite exiles: Ezra 3:10-13 – Why do the elders weep while the younger generations shout out with joy?

The sadness we feel at Christmas may even be compounded by the fact that as Christians, we know that we <i>should</i> feel a sense of joy when we reflect on the coming of Jesus. We add to our sadness, because we cannot bring ourselves to be happy when we know we should.
