The Seeds of Betrayal

Luke 22:1-6, December 21, 2017 Pastor Nick Neves

Why could the opponents of Jesus Christ not simply arrest Jesus while He was preaching in the temple courts?
What might cause a person to go from disciple to betrayer?
Sadly, many people who seem very convincing in their outward religious activities are not authentically
In Matthew 7:22-23, we learn two things about the unfaithful follower:
They are trusting in their own works, but lack for Jesus.
They did not fall away from a true relationship with Jesus, because despite their religious activity, He never them.
The scripture warns us that we should be very aware of our hearts. Christianity is not just about what you do, how you behave – it's about what you Judas loved something more than he loved Jesus.
Luke 22:3-4 – Then entered into Judas called Iscariot, who was of the number of the twelve.
To be clear – Satan is a opponent. (see Eph. 6:11, James 4:7, 1 Peter 5:8)
*While the enemy is a real threat to us, we cannot simply blame our failures on him!

NOTE: Judas fails to do the one thing that Jesus urged them to do at the end of the previous chapter's teaching – He did not his heart (see Luke 21:34-36)
There are three obvious warnings given in that passagethe disciples are told to
 Watch – be alert to the of temptation. Do not allow yourself to be by the trap of worldliness. for strength to remain alert, and to escape when necessary.
Mark 14:3-9, Matthew 26:6-13, and John 12:3-6 all indicate that Judas' heart was set on material things instead of being set on Christ.
PERSONAL APPLICATION: What battles for your heart's affection? Is there a lesser love that you have allowed to distract you from the God who has saved you? How can you guard your heart from that?
*Do not forget that God is <i>sovereign</i> , and nothing happens outside of His understanding and authority. Though the seeds of betrayal had been sown, even those seeds could not apart from the will of God.
