## Seek Servanthood

Luke 22:21-30, January 14, 2018 Pastor Nick Neves

Throughout God's Word, the is a symbol of friendship, inclusion, and unity. As Jesus finishes teaching them the significance of the Communion Sacrament, one who sits there with them is ready to
betray that unity.
Verse 22 tells us 'The Son of Man goes as it has been (decided beforehand by God), but woe to that man by whom he is betrayed.'
God has ordained for this treachery to happen, but that does not remove responsibility and guilt from Judas, who willingly betrayed Jesus in fulfillment of what had been determined.
Our sin is dangerous. It is destructive. But our sovereign God is able to use our sin in constructive ways to aid in the accomplishment of His greater good.
Verse 25 – And they began to question one another, which of them it could be who was going to do this.
Notice – we can deduce by their reaction that Judas played the role of quite convincingly.
*Fruit (right behavior) is not a indicator of true faith. (see 1 John 3:10)
In verse 24. the conversation goes from 'Which of us is the?' to 'Which of us is the?' How does this happen?

fools the 11. They didn't know he was a deceiver.     The 11 fool They fool themselves into believing that they are more faithful than they really are.
*How we view ourselves is a tricky thing. It is so easy to miss the mark in regards to how we assess our own faithfulness
Jesus seizes the moment to teach them that they were not to follow the patterns that were characteristic of the secular world they lived in.
- Secular leadership their authority over those they are leading
- Secular authorities see power as a means of benefitting
Vs. 26 – 'But it is not this way with you'
There is a radical reversal of expectations here – the world would seek power for the of not having to serve, the believer would seek power to serve God and more powerfully. (see also 1 Peter 5:1-5)
Godly leadership, sacrificiallyand there is no greater example of this that Jesus Himself.
Leadership is NOT  The ability to be lazy because of one's acquired position  The power to press your will upon others because they are weaker  Basking in the praise that you deserve for exceeding your peers  A means by which you leverage your desires
The greatest leader is the one who nothing.
God truly needs nothing! He can lead us without exploiting us because he is not lacking, we have nothing that He does not already have.
We will be better leaders when we realize that, in Jesus Christ, we have all that we need! We are lacking nothing so long as we rely on

Him.
