4. Is this man's character and faith		
Christians should aim to please God, not man, (Gal. 1:!0, 1 Thess. 2:4)		
BUT we should have <i>some</i> concern for the perceptions of others, for two important reasons:		
a. We the Lord.		
b. We desire their (see 1 Corinthians 10:31-33)		
In light of this, 1 Timothy 3:2, 8-10, and Titus 1:7-8 tell us that a biblical leader should be:		
Above, blameless, upright, dignified and holy. (see Daniel 6:4-5, 1 Peter 2:11-12)		
A person who is <i>reproachable</i> is a person who is vulnerable to expressions of or		
Blameless doesn't mean the deacon or elder is required to be flawless (see 1 John 1:8, 1 John 2:1-2), but he <i>is</i> required to be, and		
Has dignity become unimportant to some people in our day? If so, why?		
The word in Titus 1:8 speaks to the visible nature of this man's character. He walks in the ways of the Lord, and he is not ashamed of it. (see Romans 1:16)		

What kinds of behaviors put a man in risk of reproach?

-	Inappropriate attitude towards or management of	
-	Inappropriate behavior with the opposite (or same) gender.	
-	Inconsistencies in	
-	Lack of towards Jesus or others.	
-	Behavior patterns that are inconsistent depending on whether he is with church folks or around non-believers.	
What steps might a person take to be above reproach?		
For next time A leader's reputation should extend beyond the walls of the church		

1 Timothy 3:7 – And he <u>must have a good reputation with those</u> <u>outside the church</u>, so that he will not fall into reproach and the snare of the devil.
