QUESTION: Is Romans 16:1-2 evidence that women served as deacons in the early New Testament church?

WORD FOCUS: Diakonon (διάκονον) – feminine singular noun:
A generic term describing a waiter, servant, or administrator

Unless we can definitively say that *diakonon* here is a _____ and not a _____, then to appoint female deacons risks going beyond the instruction of scripture.

UNDERSTAND THIS: God has not chosen men to lead because men are _____. Men and women are equally important to the Lord.

(see Genesis 1:26-27, Galatians 3:27-29)

One of the reasons that this division of responsibility along gender lines does not have to be problematic is that **Leadership in the church is drastically, fundamentally _____ than leadership outside of the church.** (see 1 Peter 5:2-3,
