The key issue of this letter is not, the key issue is the But since Paul is the one defending the true gospel, the first two chapters
of Galatians will spend some time explaining why Paul should be trusted.
Two accusations had been raised against Paul. His enemies claimed: a. That he was a pleaser. b. That he was in his adherence to the law of Moses
In Acts 16:1-3, Paul invites Timothy to join him and Silas on a mission journey. What physical sign did Paul require Timothy to agree to if he was going to journey on with them? Why was this a strange move?
Why does Paul <i>seem</i> to act inconsistently by not requiring Titus to do the same? (see 1 Corinthians 9:19-23)
Making a great effort to please people is perilous for many reasons: 1. What pleases people isn't always
2. People's values and desires are ever
Pleasing people will divide our – we cannot serve God the right way if we are also trying to please people.
Paul is not compelled to please God so that he can win God's favor or earn his salvation. The primary thing that motivates all of Paul's actions is a for God that supersedes every other love he has.
(see 1 Thessalonians 2:4, 1 Corinthians 4:1-5)
