Ecclesiastes 6:10-12 – A Spiritual Impasse

What do you <i>mean</i> when you say that 'God is in? (see Daniel 4:35, Isaiah 46:8-10)			
Ecclesiastes 6:10-12 cause the reader to face one of life's great dilemmas: Though man has a will of his own, that will does not match the will of God. When these two wills collide, one of the two must yield, and it won't be the perfect and eternal will of God.			
Solomon begins this section by reflecting on a pair of concepts which spring from God's sovereignty:			
What has come to be has already been by God.			
God already knows the essential essence of what man			
Man is by God.			
Man is created in the of God.			
Man refuses to as the image of God.			
Man's rebellion has earned him the of God.			
Man cannot himself from the debt that he owes to God.			
The dissatisfaction we experience in life all boils down to this great spiritual impasse:			
Man doesn't want what God wants, and we can't both get what we want.
