A People and an Apostle for God's Own Possession

1 Corinthians 1:1 – Paul, <u>called</u> by the will <u>of God</u> to be an apostle of Christ Jesus, and our brother Sosthenes
Paul does not always mention his apostleship in the greetings of his letters. Why would he state it here?
The occasion of Paul's station: he was to it.
This calling involves a to preach the truth. (See Acts 9:15-16, 26:16-18)
This calling brings about a powerful in Paul to respond obediently. (see 1 Corinthians 9:16-27. Compare to Jeremiah 1:4-10, 20:7-9)
How does Paul's station as an apostle of Christ Jesus affect his relationship to the Corinthians? (see 1 Corinthians 9:1-2, 4:14-16)
*What part might Sosthenes play in this greeting?

The author is not the only one who is in God's possession...

1 Corinthians 1:2 – 2 To the church <u>of God</u> that is in Corinth, to those sanctified in Christ Jesus, <u>called</u> to be saints together with all those who in every place call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours: 3 Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Look at the greeting in the earlier letter to the church at Thessalonica...

1 Thessalonians 1:1 – Paul, Silvanus, and Timothy, To the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace.

How has Paul changed the way He addresses the church in Corinth, and how might that be significant?
Paul was <i>called</i> to be an apostle. The church has a calling too – we are <i>called</i> to be
In the original Greek, the word translated here as 'saints', $\dot{\alpha}\gamma$ iois (hag-EE-oys), literally means What is ironic about Paul describing the Corinthians in this way?
Paul doesn't want the Corinthian believers to think of themselves as
Verse 2 –called to be saints <u>together</u> with all those who in every place call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours:

1 Corinthians 1:3 - ³ *Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.*
