## The Priority of Prophecy November 28<sup>th</sup>, 2021 – Pastor Nick Neves 1 Corinthians 14:1-5

All of the spiritual gifts are blessing from God, but should some take precedence over others? Paul argues that indeed, there is a priority to the spiritual gifts.

**1 Corinthians 14:1** – Pursue love, and earnestly desire the spiritual gifts, <u>especially</u> that you may prophesy.

## Paul's argument for the priority of prophecy is straight forward:

The one who speaks in tongues edifies \_\_\_\_\_

The one who speaks prophetically edifies the \_\_\_\_\_

CLARIFICATION: What is specifically meant by prophecy here?

CLARIFICATION: What is specifically mean to be the gift of tongues here?

Paul lists three key characteristics that should help us to see why prophecy has priority over speaking in tongues:

Prophecy \_\_\_\_\_ the listener

The Greek word used here is a combination of two other words: DEMOS – to \_\_\_\_\_ OIKOS – a \_\_\_\_\_, or a dwelling place \*for what? For the Holy Spirit!

In what ways has God used prophetic expression to edify you?

## Prophecy \_\_\_\_\_\_ the listener

How is encouragement different from flattery?

To encourage a brother or sister in Christ is to *add courage* to them, by way of the sure testimony of God's scripture.

Prophecy \_\_\_\_\_ the listener

Encouragement adds courage to the listener. Consolation subtracts \_\_\_\_\_\_ from the listener.

**Psalm 94:19** – When the cares of my heart are many, your consolations cheer my soul.

**1 Corinthians 14:4** – The one who speaks in a tongue builds up himself, but the one who prophesies builds up the church...

Is it *wrong* to build up one's self?
